Recruitment in the early stages of World War One was hardly necessary as there was a rush to enlist. British descendants felt extreme loyalty to the British Empire. The recruits were looking for honour, adventure, and desired to be heroes. Camaraderie would have been a draw as everyone was signing up. As time went on, there was greater public pressure and shame for those who did not enlist.

Today, after two world wars and other conflicts, young people no longer see glory in participating in war. They do however, value helping people in distress. The Canadian Forces still appeals to a sense of duty, valour and honour to encourage recruitment. Patriotism is still a call, but it is to Canada, not the British Empire. Excitement and adventure still has attraction, but now the Canadian Forces offers education, leadership training, medical benefits, secure and exciting jobs, family support, and a sense of achievement. The attraction of camaraderie and teamwork endures. Young people today demand far more benefits than their predecessors before they are willing to engage in the Canadian Forces.
